SINGING AND SHOVELS

Pastor Edward of Waynesville, NC captured the spirit of MCCL's tour: "You don't bring your shovel—you bring your voice. Your voice is your shovel."

"You don't bring your shovel—you bring your voice. Your voice is your shovel."

That phrase echoed throughout tour as nearly 80 MCCL singers and chaperones journeyed through North Carolina and Virginia, offering healing not through tools, but through the harmony of their voices in locations that Hurricane Helene impacted in fall 2024.

Concerts. spontaneous and planned, became moments of deep connection for both singers and listeners. This tour emphasized music the as mission and connected in a special way with the work of Mennonite Disaster Service (MDS). Each concert offering was shared between MDS and MCCL.

At each location, host families welcomed the choir with open hearts and kitchens, and new friendships bloomed over shared meals and stories.

In Hendersonville, NC at a bridge rebuilt by MDS and Lutheran Disaster Relief (LDR) (photo above), singers heard firsthand from a local homeowner about the devastation his community experienced. His personal story highlighted the community's

resilience and the hope they felt after receiving help from MDS and LDR.

As Chamber singer Lia Charles reflected, the true gift wasn't just sharing music—it was discovering how that music could help make sense of joys and griefs for singers and concert attendees. Singing and shovels can both bring healing to the world!



MUSICIANSHIP CLASSES

An exciting addition to the MCCL program for the 2024 -2025 choir year is Musicianship Classes. Each week during rehearsal, singers in the auditioned choirs met in small groups for 15 minutes to focus on sight singing, rhythm reading, and music theory concepts.

Musicianship classes have profoundly impacted singers. As directors, we see the evidence of singers learning at each rehearsal, especially now that singers have been immersed in musicianship classes for a full year!

One way we have seen incredible growth is in individual singer confidence. Musicianship classes offer singers the opportunity to learn in a small group setting where each voice is heard - literally! - singing and speaking rhythms.

These designated times to practice musicianship skills have resulted in markedly stronger sight-reading abilities and greater comfort with music terminology. This allows singers to learn music faster in rehearsal and understand complex musical ideas. We are thrilled to see this growth and look forward to watching how these classes continue to increase MCCL singers' skills and confidence.

MCCL VOICE LESSON PROGRAM






25 YEARS OF SINGING


